Work in Italy, What should I do?



Is an "Info Point" service.

It provides general information for **EU nationals** and **Non-EU nationals** about living and working conditions in Italy.

In order to be able to work in Italy and/or other European countries you will still have additional legal obligations and administrative procedures to go through to get access to the European labour market – and you're not entitled to EURES mobility schemes.

As it is reiterated by the European Commission: Employment, social affairs and inclusion for non-EU citizens: "The freedom to move to another EU country to work without a work permit is a right for EU nationals".

Non-EU nationals may have the right to work in an EU country or to be treated equally with EU nationals as regards conditions of work. These rights depend on their status as family members of EU nationals and on their own nationality. Due to complex immigration procedures, employers may as well decide not to go through your application.

Work in Italy, **What should I do?**



Many of EURES' services (in particular EURES on-line services) are freely available for any user with access to the web. If you already live and work in the EEA territory or Switzerland, you can contact a local or regional EURES Adviser to get advice.

However, finding a job via EURES does not change the legal obligations and administrative procedures that may apply to non-EU citizens.

If you intend to move from a non-EEA country (except Switzerland) to live and work in the European Economic Area or Switzerland, often your own Ministry of Foreign Affairs can provide you with information on legal requirements to move abroad or refer you to useful information centres.

This Info point (prepared by EURES Italy) is dedicated to basic and first level information for **EU nationals** and **Non-EU nationals** interested in working in Italy, We reiterate that the Italian Authority responsible for the entry and stay of non-EU citizens is the Ministry of the Interior.

What documents you'll need to **Work in Italy**

Every citizen of the European Union has the right to move and reside freely in Italy or within the territory of another Member State other than that of which he/she is a national. Different formalities are required depending on the length of stay (exceeding three months or shorter stay).

Right of residence for up to three months

Union citizens have the right of residence in Italy for a period of up to three months without any conditions or formalities other than the requirement to hold a valid travel document (i.e. identity card or passport).

These provisions also apply to family members accompanying or joining the Union citizen, who are not nationals of a Member State, provided that they are holders of a valid passport or an entry visa where required, or a valid residence card as family member of a Union citizen.

EU citizens and their family members can report their presence in Italy in different ways.

What documents you'll need to **Work in Italy**

Right of residence for more than three months

Union citizens have the right of residence in Italy for a period of longer than three months if they:

- *are workers or self-employed persons in Italy;*
- *have sufficient resources for themselves and their family members not to become a burden on the social assistance system during their period of residence and have comprehensive sickness insurance cover, or any other equivalent means;*
- *are enrolled at a private or public establishment for the purpose of following a course of study, including vocational training and have sufficient resources for themselves and their family members not to become a burden on the social assistance system and a comprehensive sickness insurance cover;*
- *are family members accompanying or joining a Union citizen who has the right to reside in Italy for more than three months.*

What documents you'll need to **Work in Italy**

Permanent residence

If you have **lived legally, meeting the conditions to stay in Italy**, for a continuous period of 5 years you automatically acquire the right of permanent residence there. This means that you can stay in the country as long as you want.

Your continuity of residence is not affected by:

- temporary absences (less than 6 months per year)
- longer absences for compulsory military service
- one absence of 12 consecutive months, for important reasons such as pregnancy and childbirth, serious illness, work, vocational training or a posting to another country

You can lose your right to permanent residence if you live outside the country for more than 2 consecutive years.

What documents you'll need to **Work in Italy**



Tax identification number for foreign citizens Now **Health Insurance Card**

The tax identification number provides a means of identification of foreign citizens in their relations with public authorities and other administrations. For individuals, it is determined on the basis of personal data and is made up of an expression of 16 alphanumeric characters.

Citizens of European Union may apply for the tax identification number to any office of the Italian Revenue Agency showing, along with the request for the assignment, a valid identification document (identity card or passport).

What documents you'll need to **Work in Italy**



Tax identification number for foreign citizens Now **Health Insurance Card**

The Health Card (TS) is the personal document that is issued to all citizens who are entitled to the services provided by the National Health Service (SSN).

It replaced the old green card containing only the tax code data assigned to the citizen in the Tax Register.

The health card is free and can only be issued if:

- the citizen has the tax code correctly assigned by the Revenue Agency
- is registered with the relevant ASL and this has transmitted his data to the "Health Card System".

What documents you'll need to **Work in Italy**



DRIVING IN ITALY

Holders of driving licences issued by an EU Member State can drive in Italy (only the category of vehicle for which their licence is valid). It is however advisable to apply for the **conversion** or the **recognition of validity** in order to facilitate procedures regarding renewal or duplicate licence.

During the conversion procedure the original licence is substituted with an Italian licence.

With the **recognition of validity** the driver keeps the original licence.

If you are living and driving in Italy for more than 6 months it is necessary to register the vehicle and pay the registration fee to the competent local authorities.

Car insurance is valid throughout Europe.
